LITERARY GROUP'S FIRST BOOK GATHERS WILLIAMSON COUNTY WRITERS

Williamson County Council for the Written Word Currie Alexander Powers and Kathy Hardy Rhodes, Co-editors

(Franklin TN, July 1, 2009) – The Council for the Written Word (CWW) announces the release of its first anthology, *Gathering: Writers of Williamson County*, published by CPO Publishing, a Roger Waynick Book Group company. This eclectic collection features 31 authors—CWW members and Hall of Fame award winners—some published for the first time and some famously published, such as Madison Smartt Bell, Tom T. Hall, Robert Hicks, and Paula Wall. CWW is a Franklin-based nonprofit literary organization celebrating its 10th year of encouraging, educating, and empowering local and area writers.

"The work of CWW is mostly others-oriented," says Kathy Rhodes, co-editor of the book and President of CWW. "We promote the art of writing by hosting a bimonthly critique group and two annual workshops, widely publicized and drawing from a national pool of authors. We also preserve the county's literary heritage by maintaining a database of over 400 authors who have lived in Williamson County and published a book, and we're the only organization in the state of Tennessee to keep this kind of record. Now we are delighted to put our own book on the market." Dave Stewart, CWW Vice President says, "Gathering collects original works by current best-selling and new Southern writers from the heart of Williamson County, Tennessee."

Gathering's stories range from Civil War to Civil Rights; from a hippie flower-child in olive drab fatigues to a pale-face Indian girl in a chicken-feather band; from a sapient farmboy whose sunsets are two cornfields away from his sunrises to a sassy, spiky-heeled senior who trails pickle juice from a diner's dills stashed in her purse. The stories are rich in qualities readers treasure in the best Southern literature: a sense of character and place; an appreciation of language, humor, and tradition; a love of the land.

Rhodes says, "We envision this book in every household in Williamson County. In its richness of words and depth of talent, it is a reflection of this place we call home. We also encourage people to buy it as a gift for friends and family, here and afar. Buying this local collection is like tying a ribbon around a bunch of freshly picked buttercups gathered along a country lane and handing them over with a heartfelt smile."

Bill Peach of Franklin is a CWW member as well as a Hall of Fame award recipient.

The Council for the Written Word (CWW) is a nonprofit organization whose mission is empowering writers, promoting the art of writing in Williamson County and beyond, and preserving the literary heritage of Williamson County.

CWW's primary project is maintaining a database of past and present authors of Williamson County. *Williamson County Celebrates the Written Word* is an alphabetical index of every person who has lived in Williamson County and published a book. It contains a brief biography of each of more than three hundred local authors, as well as a listing of their published works. Once presented in book format, it is now online at the Williamson County Public Library website, updated regularly: http://lib.williamson-tn.org/, Local Authors Collection.

CWW presents two annual workshops:


- Spring Writers' Workshop, an intensive half-day event with instruction and hands-on experience in a specific genre
- Fall Writers' Seminar, an all-day event for aspiring writers with local and area authors, agents, editors, publishers, and publicists

CWW conducts regular monthly business meetings.

CWW supports a writing critique group, which meets the first and third Saturdays of each month at 10:30 at the Williamson County Public Library in Franklin. This group is open to all writers, members and non-members, with any level of writing skill in any genre.

On occasion, CWW hosts a Hall of Fame Banquet or Reception, honoring a Williamson County resident whose personal and/or professional dedication and contributions have enriched the literary community and/or the county's heritage.
